

Power of attorney, Stafford, August 17, 1702, to Nicholas Brent of Woodstock in Virginia, Gent., from Mr. Samuel Mathews of King and Queen county, to make sale of all or part of a tract of 5,211 acres belonging to the said Mathews, between Chapawamsic and Quantiquat Creeks.

Deed, Prince William county, September 18, 1733, from Robert and William Brent of Charles county, Maryland, to Hugh French, Gent., of Stafford county, Virginia, conveying land in Prince William, which was patented by George Brent, January 9, 1694-5.

Deed, Prince William county, November 25, 1739, from George Brent of Stafford, Gent., and Charine [sic] his wife, conveying to William Clifton of Prince William county, Gent., 500 acres in Prince William, part of a tract of 1,000 acres, patented by Giles Brent, September, 1654.

Deposition, Stafford, 1758, of Francis Hammersley of Charles county, Maryland, Gent., aged about forty years, that he well knew Richard, Elizabeth and Ann, children of Robert Brent of Stafford, that the said Richard died without issue, he believes under age; the said Elizabeth married Jesse Doyne, late of Charles county, Maryland, Gent., and that Robert Doyne was their son and heir and that the daughter Anne died without issue: That Anne, the widow of the said Robert Brent, lived on his plantation after her husband's death until she died, and that Jesse and Elizabeth Doyne were in possession of all the said Elizabeth's father's estate.

Robert Doyne, sonne of Jesse and Elizabeth, was born February 26, 1709, [from the register of Durham parish, Charles county, Maryland].

nephew David Fox and his heirs, but if it should so happen that he should not be alive nor have any heirs at the time of the decease of his said wife, he gave his estate to Mrs. Burgess, and all the daughters of G. H., who should be living at that time. David Fox is dead, and Mrs. Burgess is his only sister and admx. Mrs. Chichester died during the suit, and it was revived by George Heale, in behalf of all his daughters, several of whom were born after the testator's death. (For Fox pedigree see QUARTERLY XVIII., 59-64; for Heale pedigree, see *Ibid.*, 202-204. William Fox married Anne Chinn, who married 2dly. Richard Chichester. George Heale married her sister Catherine Chinn and left four daughters. Mrs. Burgess, was Frances Fox, daughter of Samuel Fox and wife of Charles Burgess. Her brother David Fox is omitted from the pedigree.)

Page 30. Thornton vs. Buckner. In Chancery:

Thomas Pannell and John Prosser received from Sir William Berkeley, November 4, 1673, a patent for 2500 acres of land. John Prosser died leaving 1 John, eldest son and heir, who left surviving a son Samuel Prosser; 2 Roger, who died s. p. and 3 Anthony, who left son Anthony. These sons Samuel and Anthony sold their interest Jany 21, 1717 to Francis and Anthony Thornton the plaintiffs. Thomas Pannell died leaving issue a son and two daughters: 1 William, 2 Mary, who married Francis Stone, 3 Isabella, who married Richard Phillips, and died after her father and left a daughter Catherine who married John Knight. John Knight and Catherine, his wife, made a deed 24 March, 1705 to Francis and Anthony Thornton.

John Buckner devised land to Thomas Buckner, one of the defendants, and Richard Buckner was the other defendant.

Page 35. April, 1730. Marston vs Parrish. Detinue:

John Williams made his will 22d April, 1713, and left a wife and 3 children. The widow married John Marston, who made his will December 1, 1719, and then she married 3rdly. Parrish the defendant in the suit. None of Williams' children are of age.

Clarissa may suggest that Clarissa B. (Smith) Tucker was somehow related to this Smith family, but this Clarissa lived longer than that widow of John Tucker. Several facts suggest a relationship to President James Madison. Frances Taylor, sister of Erasmus Taylor, married Ambrose Madison, grandfather of President James Madison. Nellie Conway Madison, sister of President Madison, married Isaac Hite and lived in Frederick County, which adjoins Hampshire County. William Madison, brother of President Madison, had granddaughter Jane Chapman who married Thomas Towles Slaughter. And Eleanor Madison, sister to Ambrose and Frances (Taylor) Madison, married James Coleman whose great-great-granddaughter Lelia Sue Scott was a descendant of Moses Tucker. In addition, John Wesley Tucker (son of William Porter Tucker, grandson of Moses Tucker) named one son James Madison Tucker. But it has been impossible to determine which Madison married this Clarissa Smith.

John Monroe's will, which named executors Jesse, James and Marquis Monroe and was witnessed by Levi Arnold, Joseph Nixon and Abraham Creswell, named the following children:

NOTES ON KAY AND ALLIED FAMILIES.

From Barber's "British Family Names" we learn that the Danish "Kay", the Swedish "Key", the Flemish "Kai" and "Key" and the Dutch "Kea" are variants of Key, a personal name. In Waters' "Genealogical Gleanings in England", pp. 939-940 is given the will of Matthew Kaye of Eastcombe, Parish of East Greenwich, Kent, Gentleman, dated 14 November, 1610, proved 5 October, 1612. Among the numerous relatives mentioned in this will, are Arthur, Francis, Peter and Paul, sons of his deceased brother Arthur, and Peter son of his brother Edward, brother Robert Kaye of Woodsom in the County of York, and his (Robert's) son, John, brothers Richard and George and nephew James, who is to be executor. A brief genealogy of this family is given in the Visitation of Yorkshire, 1563-4, p. 175, showing that Robert, Arthur, Richard, Edward, Francis, George, Matthew (the testator of the above will) and John, were sons of John Kay who married Dorothy, daughter of Robert Maltrever of Woodsom, John Kay being son and heir of Arthur Kay who married Beatrice, the daughter of Matthew Wentworth. It seems likely that Robert Kay of Woodsom in Yorkshire was ancestor of the Virginia immigrants, James¹ and William¹ Kay.

In April, 1670 (Old Rappa 1668-1672, p. 227), we find James¹ and William¹ Kay witnessing a deed from John Prosser to Anthony Savage, and a little later (*Idem.*, p. 320), January 1670/1, James¹ Kay witnesses a power of attorney from George Mott to John Mott. In "Minutes of the Council and General Court of Virginia", p. 249, April 5, 1671, occurs this entry: "whereas Mr. William Drummond claimed a debt due him from the estate of Mr. John Curren deceased amounting to £165 - 15s - 2d and there being an attachment served and returned by the sheriff of Rappahannock in the hands of Mr. James¹ Key, and Captain Christopher Evelyn also claiming another debt due from the estate of the said Curren, the attachment is continued in the said Mr. Keyes' hands." A few years later (*Idem.*, p. 444, March 17, 1675/6), "in the suit brought by Mr. James Kay plaintiff, against Col. George Mason", the plaintiff is ordered to pay costs, etc.; at the same time (*Idem.*, p. 443, March 16, 1675/6), "the difference between Christopher Rogers and William¹ Kay upon an appeal from Stafford County Court is referred back to Stafford Court to re-examine the difference between them and make report to the next General Court." In 1673, James¹ Kay was a justice of Old Rappahannock County (Stanard's Extracts from Rappahannock, Essex, etc., p. 15). We have no land patent for James¹ Kay prior to 1678, but from the preceding notes, he was here by 1670 with definite social standing as is evidenced by his being called "Mister" and was probably born about 1635.

On April 1, 1726, Constance Paine aged 63 (King George Rec. D. B. 1, p. 344) deposed that she knew James¹ Kay, Sr., and William¹ Kay, his brother, and that they were reputed to be Lancashire men, that James² Kay married Sarah Iveson and had 5 children, James³ Kay, the son, married Mary Pannill and had a son James⁴, the only son now living. On October 9, 1677, Joan Iveson of Gloucester County, gave a negro girl to her grandson, William², son of James¹ Kay when he came of age, and the increase of this negro to James¹ Kay's other children, James², Robert², Richard², and Ann². Wit: William¹ Kay and Abraham Iveson. (Old Rappahannock Deeds, Wills, etc., No. 6, p. 26.) This is the last record the writer has found of William¹ Kay, whether he died childless in Stafford or returned to England we do not know. Joan Iveson was most likely the widow of Abraham Iveson, Sr., who in 1636 was a headright for James Vanerit (Nugent's Cavaliers and Pioneers, Vol. 1, p. 50). On March 20, 1650/1 Mr. Anthony Ellyott patented 1,150 acres lying on the northwest side of the North River in Mobjack Bay and 100 acres lying on northwest side of the North River in Mobjack Bay, running along the marked trees dividing this from the land of Abraham Iveson (*Idem.*, p. 208). A few months later (*Idem.*, p. 217), Mr. Abraham Iveson patented 655 acres on the Southwest side of the North River in Mobjack Bay. By 1656 Abraham Iveson, Jr., is patenting land (*Idem.*, p. 328) and in 1665 (*Idem.*, p. 548) Mr. Abraham Iveson, Sr., has among his headrights for 985 acres in Gloucester County, Anne Key. Between this date and 1677 when Joan Iveson made a gift to her grandchildren, Abraham, Sr., must have died. Anne Key, who was his headright, may have been his granddaughter.

In 1678 (S. L. O. Book 9, p. 630), James¹ Kayes patented 2,000 acres in Rappahannock on the north side of the river and in the "freshes" thereof, beginning at a marked tree standing on a point near the north of the Doeg's Creek on the north side thereof, 1,680 acres of this land being formerly granted unto Col. Gerrard Fowke and Richard Heybeard on March 28, 1664, and sold by the said Richard Heybeard (being the survivor), unto the said James¹ Kayes, the remaining 320 acres being due for the transportation of seven persons into the colony, viz: John Palmer, Jane Norway, Ann Fielding, Thomas Richards, Nicholas Delfe, Thomas Arnold. This land was in Old Rappahannock County up to 1692, when the territory on the north side of the Rappahannock River between Lancaster and Stafford Counties became Richmond County. In 1721 the western part of Richmond became King George County, and from that date James¹ Kay's descendants were residents of the new county.

James¹ Kay, Sr., died between the date of the above patent and 1687, for on November 19, 1687 (Old Rappahannock 1680-1688, p. 441) James² Kay and Mary his wife sold to Richard Price for 4,500 lbs. tob. a tract of land in the "freshes" of the Rappahannock River, containing 100 acres "being part of a dividend of land purchased by Mr. James¹ Kay late of

this county deceased of Mr. Richard Heaberd of Stafford County containing 1,680 acres and patented March 24, 1664/5." Mary gave power of attorney to her loving friend and kinsman James Taylor to relinquish her dower rights in this land. By July, 1701, James² Kay was dead and Mary, his widow, presented in court the appraisement of his estate (Richmond County O. B. 3, p. 104). Francis Stone in 1707 made gifts to his step-children "Sarah,³ and Katherine³ Kay, daughters of his wife Mary Stone by her former husband James² Kay" (William & Mary, 1st Series, Vol. 17, p. 77), and on April 8, 1714, evidently having just reached 14 James³ Kay, 3rd of the name, chose William Thornton his guardian (Richmond County O. B. 6, p. 188). About 1730 (King George D. B. "A", p. 96) he deeded land to Samuel Skinker reciting he was the only heir of his father James³. In 1769 the King George Quit Rent Roll shows he owned 128 acres (Archives Division, Va. State Library). This James³ seems to have lived to be very old for the will of James³ Kay, Sr., presumably the same person, dated June, 1794, proved February 5, 1795, is in King George Rec. W. B. 2, p. 186. His legatees were his grandchildren, Molly⁵ and James⁵ Kay, "children of my son John⁴ and Katherine his wife." The grandson did not long survive for on April 2, 1795, his will was probated (*Idem.*, p. 190). His only legatee was his sister Molly⁵ Kay whom he left to the care of his "uncle John Feed". It would seem probable that with the death of this James⁵ Kay, the male line of James², son of the immigrant James¹ became extinct.

We take up next Robert² son of the immigrant James¹. Robert² by 1695 had married Mary, daughter of John Waight, of Essex County, for in that year her brother Robert confirmed to her the land bequeathed her by her father, 209 acres lying on the north side of a creek called The Golden Vale "and now in her possession" (Essex Rec., 1692-1695, p. 379). This land in the Essex Quit Rent Roll for 1704 is listed as in the possession of Robert² Kay. In Essex O. B. 1723-25, p. 65, November 20, 1723, there is a suit for debt brought by Ann Ayres, late Ann Sallis, Alexander Doniphan and Sarah, his wife, late Sarah Sallis, Samuel Sallis and Sarah³ Kay by Robert² Kay her father, plaintiffs agt. Robert Taliaferro executor of John Taliaferro, deceased, and John Taliaferro, son and heir of Francis Taliaferro, deceased defts. The plaintiffs seem to be heirs of Samuel Sallis whose estate was inventoried in 1704. Robert² Kay's land on the north side of "Golden Vale" Creek extended to the Rappahannock River across which his son Robert³ operated a ferry, giving bond therefor with Robert Jones as his security in January, 1726/7 (Essex D. & W. 18, p. 246). With the erection of Caroline County in 1728, the upper end of Essex, which was St. Mary's Parish fell into the new county, and in 1729 (King George O. B. 1721-34, p. 460), we find a reference to "Kay's landing in Caroline".

But before that Robert² Sr., had died and his will dated November 5, 1725, proved July 19, 1726, is in Essex W. B. 4, p. 157. He bequeaths

to "loving son Robert³ one trunk that I brought of England and one brown table and my gun and my cooper's tools". He also mentions daughters Mary³ and Sarah³ (both under age) and makes wife Sarah and son Robert³ executors. Robert³ Junior presumably son of his father's first wife, Mary Waight was of age in 1726 and probably born about 1700.

The fact that his land lay now in Caroline takes Robert³ Jr., definitely out of Essex County affairs, and we next hear of him through Orange County Records (D. B. 5, p. 38) when on March 24, 1742/3, Samuel Taliaferro of Caroline County sells to Robert³ Kay of the same 400 acres in Orange County granted September 8, 1736, to John Garth and by the said John Garth conveyed to said Samuel Taliaferro. Garth's patent for this land (S. L. O. Book 16, p. 174) describes it as lying on the branches of Stanton's River, the name given then to the north branch of the Rapidan. After 1749, this land lay in Culpeper, the Rapidan dividing Orange and Culpeper. The only other patent to John Garth shown in the land books is for 400 acres in Louisa County on both sides of the South Anna River beginning at John Ragland's corner (S. L. O. Book 22, p. 416, August 20, 1745). This land was never in Orange.

We do not know the name of Robert³ Kay's wife, nor the exact date of his death, but on August 11, 1763 (Car. O. B. 1759-63, p. 450), the court orders John Boutwell, John Bowie, John Catlett and John Miller to appraise the estate of Robert³ Kay, deceased, while William Twyman, Jonathan Cowherd, Thomas Kirtley, Jeremiah Early or any three of them are ordered to appraise his estate in Culpeper County. In 1770 (Car. O. B. 1767-1770, p. 408), Robert Gilchrist became guardian to Robert⁴ and James⁴ Kay. In Culpeper Rec. D. B. G., p. 366, October 10, 1774, Robert⁴ Kay and Margaret his wife of St. Mark's Parish, Culpeper County, and James⁴ Kay and Sarah, his wife, of Caroline County, sold to Thomas Graves of Bromfield Parish, Culpeper, 400 acres in Culpeper, "the former patent of John Garth". The only land of John Garth's that could be in Culpeper was the 400 acres that Robert³ Kay had bought some thirty years before, hence we conclude the present grantors Robert⁴ and James⁴ are his sons.

James⁴ remained in Caroline where he died about 1795, for on March 12 of that year James Robb, George Catlett, Thomas Miller, John Hipkins, Ambrose Jones, David Morrow or any three of them are ordered to divide the estate of James⁴ Kay according to his will (Car. O. B. 1794-96, p. 70).

Robert⁴, James⁴'s brother, was as we have seen living in Culpeper in 1774 with his wife Margaret, whose ancestry we shall take up later. According to the Bible record, "Robert Kay, Sr., born February, 1751, died October 20, 1823, aged 72 years, 8 months, 20 days", and "Peggy, his wife, died May 21, 1815, aged 66 years". The exact date of the marriage is unknown, but their elder son Gabriel⁵ was born May 13, 1774, and their younger son, James⁵, January 19, 1778. Robert⁴ Kay, like many other residents of Culpeper, moved to Christian County, Kentucky, where his

daughter of Nicholas Battaile was unmarried at time of the suit referred to, and never married.

Quoting from Va. Mag. Hist, VII p 425: "Henry Fitzhugh², (Henry², William¹) married Sarah Battaile, Oct. 23d, 1746, of Caroline Co. Will dated Feb 12th, proved in King George June 5th, 1783. Son John Battaile Fitzhugh lands in Caroline and Orange Co. Son William land on Cedar Run Fauquier Co; to younger sons, Nicholas, Richard, Mordecai, Battaile, and Giles, Lands in Fairfax, called Ravensworth".

The William Fitzhugh mentioned here was William of "Chatham," who later acquired "Ravensworth" also. His daughter married George Washington Parke Custis of "Arlington", and their daughter married Gen. Robert E. Lee. The Ravensworth estate passed to the descendants of Gen. Lee. and they still own it.

THE TALIAFERRO FAMILY.

IN TYLER'S QUARTERLY for July, 1929, was published a genealogy of the Taliaferro Family compiled by the writer. Now, a decade later, it seems desirable to reconstruct the first two or three generations due to certain court records of the Northern Neck which have just been made available. To begin: Robert Taliaferro, the founder of the family, did not die in 1687, nor did he marry Sarah Grymes. It was his son, Robert, who died in 1687 (O. S.) and who married Sarah. She was born Catlett and not Grymes. Robert Taliaferro I., married Katherine (not Sarah), daughter of the Rev. Charles Grymes (d. 1677) and Katherine, his wife. This Robert died in or before 1677, probably in Gloucester County. On Aug., 26, 1678 Katherine Grymes, extrx. of Charles Grymes, Clerke, Dec'd, had a suit brought against her by Thomas Godlington of London who "demanded proof that the said pltf. being Ex'x. Mr. John Morecock declared on oath that he drew the decedent's will which was proved in Gloster County & order for probat granted the plte which the dfte not accepting as proof for being a single testimony the Court conceive it good ground for a Reference to ye plte till ye next Court & have hereby accordingly granted it. (TYLER'S QUARTERLY, vol. 5. p. 260). Thus we know that the Rev. Charles Grymes had died, testate, in Gloucester County before this date and that his widow was Katherine. Their daughter was named for her mother and it was she who married Robert Taliaferro I., of Gloucester County, who had also died by this time. He may have died as early as 1672 (or

*Pages 501-517, this volume.

even earlier) when Katherine Taliaferro was granted 600 acres (Nov., 20, 1672): "These are the rights due Mrs. Katherine Taliaferro—600 acres of Land due for the transportation of 8 negroes and four english servants, viz: Richard George, John Dalton, John Brookes (and) Henry Hodges. Which rights I doe hereby assigne over to my son Robert Taliaferro." Witnessed by William Mosely and James Kay (Rappahannock County Deed Book #5. p/99). The record goes on: "These are to Certifie that Mrs. Katherine Taliaferro did before us swear to the Justness of these Rights & that noe land had been taken to the best of her knowledge. William Mosely and James Kay. Juratis coram Nobis. Recordate xx Die Novembris, 1672. Edmund Craske, Cl. Cur."

After the death of Robert Taliaferro I., Katherine seems to have married again as she is later called Katherine Dedman. A Henry Deadman appears in Rappahannock County in 1672 and a Thomas Deadman in 1689. Perhaps the first was her second husband Aug., 9, 1711. Robert Taliaferro of St. Mary's Parish, Essex Co., sold to Augustine Smith for 10,000 pounds of tobacco & caske the woodland ground containing 200 acres, said land being part of a Pattent of 600 acres formerly granted to Mr. Charles Grymes on Sept., 4, 1654 & Renewed by Pattent Oct., 3, 1657, then renewed again by Pattent dated Nov., 22, 1661 and by the last Will & Testament of the said Charles Grymes bequeathed to Katherine Dedman, Grandmother to the said Robert Taliaferro, to her and her heirs forever, and doth by right belong unto the said Robert Taliaferro, party to these presents, etc. (D. & W. #13, p. 426).

After the death of Robert Taliaferro, II., in 1687, his widow, Sarah (nee Catlett) married twice. Samuel Sallis was her first choice; he died in 1704 and she then selected Samuel Short, who seems to have survived her for in 1724 his wife was Frances who released her dower rights in land sold by her husband to Thomas Evans. June 6, 1688. Sarah Taliaferro, admx. of the estate of her deceased husband, Robert Taliaferro, gave bond for her administration with Francis and John Taliaferro as her bondsmen. Book 1686-1692, p. 74). The same day John and Francis Taliaferro "acknowledged themselves indebted to His Majesties Justices of the Peace for the County of Rappahannock to the sum of 200,000 pounds of good tobacco and caske to be paid into the aid Justices, their heirs, etc., in case, Sarah Taliaferro, who is admitted Admx. of the Estate of her deceased husband, Mr. Robert Taliaferro, shall not well & truly administer & render an account when thereunto Lawfully required" (O. B. "2, p. 95). On Dec., 6, 1688, Samuel Sallis and Sarah, his wife, admx. of Robert Taliaferro, dec'd, were mentioned. (Book 1686-1692, p. 107). On the same day there was a suit: Hugh French vs. Samuel Sallis as marrying the widow of Robert Taliaferro. (*Ibid*). On May 10, 1692 Mr. Samuel Sallis was appointed surveyor of the Highway in St. Mary's Parish, then in the new county of Essex (O. B. #1, p. 3). Nov., 10, 1697. Samuel Sallis and

Mansel Blackgrove vs. Thomas Addison.

ELLIS WILLIAM, dec'd. His last will and testament was dated 28 January 1720. Seized of 190 acres of land. Survived by his widow, Ann who died prior to 1729. Testator devised certain lands in James City to Mansel Blackgrove and his heirs, provided the latter should build certain houses for the widow Ann. Blackgrove did not comply. Baron Burwell petitioned for a Grant of the land. Thomas Addison's connection is not shown.

"The widow is married to her third husband, Parrish."

ALDERSON, RICHARD, died with a will dated 16 September 1695. Survived by widow, Margaret and "children" of whom only one, a son, named:

ROCCOW, WILSON, died with a will dated 26 August 1713. Possessed of considerable estate. Survived by his widow, now the wife of Dandridge. Testator provided a legacy for his Godson Pasco Curle when he should arrive at the age of 21 years. Curle died under age.

Iones vs. Langhorn.

GODWIN, MARY, died with a will. She was possessed of several negroes. "Daughter Mary Rice shall have use of my whole estate, real and personal after she comes to the age of — years, during her natural life." "And if my daughter shall leave heirs lawfully begotten of her body, that those heirs shall have my whole estate, etc." "She married Myres, dec'd, by whom she had four children and she is now married to Langhorn and has four children by him." None of the children are named.

FITZHUGH, ———, formerly of Westmoreland but now of Stafford County married a daughter of McCarty, a lawyer, who died with will survived by widow, several daughters, and three sons, one named Dennis McCarty.

PROSSER, JOHN, died with a will. Issue, two sons:

GREEN, RALPH, died prior to 1689. Will dated 5 March 1685/6. He had patented 1100 acres in Gloucester County. Survived by his widow, who was alive 1688/9, and two sons:

nephew David Fox and his heirs, but if it should so happen that he should not be alive nor have any heirs at the time of the decease of his said wife, he gave his estate to Mrs. Burgess, and all the daughters of G. H., who should be living at that time. David Fox is dead, and Mrs. Burgess is his only sister and admx. Mrs. Chichester died during the suit, and it was revived by George Heale, in behalf of all his daughters, several of whom were born after the testator's death. (For Fox pedigree see QUARTERLY XVIII., 59-64; for Heale pedigree, see *Ibid.*, 202-204. William Fox married Anne Chinn, who married 2dly. Richard Chichester. George Heale married her sister Catherine Chinn and left four daughters. Mrs. Burgess, was Frances Fox, daughter of Samuel Fox and wife of Charles Burgess. Her brother David Fox is omitted from the pedigree.)

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John Grigsby, on April 3, 1699 patented 887 acres of land deeded him by Nicholas Battain (N. N. G. B. 2-234). The traditional wife of John Grigsby is Jane Rosser or Prosser, the name of a family associated with John Grigsby and the Ashtons but actual proof of this connection has not been found.

Captain Simon Miller, aged 37 years, in will in old Rappahannock County, dated February 16, 1679, proven May 22, 1684, gives "a mare foale to my wife's son Anthony Prosser; sons of Mr. Prosser to have every one of them a heifer after my decease." He made James Ashton, oversees of will, "he to dispose of children at 16 years of age" (Rap. Bk. 6 p. 10). Captain Miller's wife appears to have been the widow of John Prosser, whose will was probated in Rappahannock in 1677.

The Ashtons came from Lincolnshire, England. Colonel Peter Ashton of Lincolnshire owned lands in Stafford County. He patented 2550 acres there on March 27, 1665. (C. P. 434). Some of his land afterwards fell in Essex and was named "Chatterton" after an estate of that name in Lincoln owned by the Ashtons. Col. Ashton made his will in 1669, same probated 1671. He left his Virginia estate to his brothers, James Ashton of Kirby Underwood and John Ashton of Louth, in Lincolnshire who came to Virginia. (V. 25-165).

In Essex county on June 17, 1714, John Grigsby, Henry Fitzhugh and John Fitzhugh met and valued a plantation there called "Chatterton" as shown in the following document (Essex Bk. 14, 1711-16, p. 401).

"We the subscribers, at the request of Lyonel Elton of Bristol, merchants, and John Taylor who intermarried with the relict of Stephen Lloyd, did meet on plantation called "Chatterton" in the above county June 7, 1714, and did value the estate that was in partnership between said James Lloyd, Issac Elton and Stephen Lloyd." (Rec. July 20, 1715).

St. Paul's Register (p. 37) for the year 1727 contains the following entry "John Grigsby, supposed to be one hundred and seven years old died October 11th." This could not refer to the John Grigsby of this sketch for his will was dated nov. 17. 1728/29 and probated November 11, 1730. (Bk. "M" p. 17).

This age seems improbable for the 18th century. If true it would place his date of birth in 1640. He could therefore have been the father of the above John Grigsby and of Thomas Grigsby who died about 1736. (See Gregg family).

John Grigsby, whose will was probated in 1730, had the following children named in his will:

- I. John was bequeathed the Nicholas Battain tract of land and three negroes, Sambo, Thorn and Dick. He signed the inventory of his nephew John Travis, in Stafford on September 9, 1735 (M-184). His inventory was filed in Stafford in 1750.

John Grigsby, immigrant ancestor of this family, first appears in the records of Essex County, where, on June 9, 1671, he witnessed a deed for 600 acres conveyed by John Prosser to John Stephens. (Rap. 1668-72, p. 514). A deed dated 1778, in Stafford, refers to land leased by Howson Hooe to Thomas Grigg (Gregg), but not "Thomas Grigsby" as often quoted, said lease was dated September 1661, and was referred to as bounded by land formerly granted to Granger, Horton & Co. "purchased by John Grigsby of James Ashton by deed bearing date of September 26, 16____, recorded in Stafford County and descended by will to his son Thomas Grigsby. "

John Grigsby removed to Stafford previous to August 18, 1686, for James Ashton of Stafford, in his will of that date, leaves Richard Elkin 100 acres adjoining upon John Grigsby of "the 1/4 dividend" (10 V. 292). James Ashton was a brother of John Ashton of Stafford whose will was made in 1675, sworn to 6 day, 7 month, 1682, and probated January 26, 1682-83. (Sweeney p. 88). John Ashton bequeathed legacies to his wife Elizabeth if she came to Virginia to live; to Thomas Bunbury L 5; to Captain John Ashton 20 sh., brother James Ashton to be exr. but after his death to my cousin John Ashton of Russell St. at the Adam and Eve in London.

On September 9, 1690, John Grigsby was one of the appraisers of the estate of Ralph Elkin, father of Richard Elkin, (45 V. 21). He may have been related to the Ashtons and Elkins for Richard Bryant in his will dated April 5, 1703, bequeathed to his son Nathaniel Bryant "all my land which I now enjoy in Virginia, his mother to live wholly upon the plantation where I now live;" to daughter Elizabeth Elkin 400 L. tbco., Richard Elkin to give my grandson Richard Elkin a mare, son-in-law William Redmond to live on plantation where his mother lives for 7 years; (probably step son) wife Ann, extrx. (partial abstract - Z. 227).

Nathaniel Bryant, above mentioned, in his nuncupative will made March 21, 1732-3, gave unto Mrs. Mary Amees all of his whole estate (M-p. 100). Mary Amees (Meese) was the only daughter of John Grigsby.

THE KENDALL FAMILY

Thomas¹ Kendall, ancestor of this family, came to Kent Island on the ----- in 1631 which was the year Captain William Claiborne colonized that Island. (See Claiborne and Butler, V.H.G.) He was one of Claiborne's men and served there 1631-36. Thomas Kendall, with John Sturman and Thomas Youell, moved from Kent Island in 1636 to St. Marys because of Lord Baltimore's disturbance of William Claiborne. (Sturman notes, W. & M. Quart. No reference given) Thomas Kendall died about 1646. His will, was dated Nov. 9, 1646, no county shown. He gave personalty to the son of Roger Baxter of Kent Island and leaves a trust fund for his three children, not named, under the guardianship of Thomas Youell with John Sturman as a witness. (Md. Mag. 28-181, 262) (Archives and Court Records) Roger Baxter in his deposition of 1660 states that they had moved to St. Marys as Puritans. A number of these Puritans migrated to Virginia. (See Butler V.H.G.) Thomas Sturman, his wife, a daughter and a son, John came from Hadman Parish Co. Bucks, Eng., on the "Sarah Ellis" in 1640 and Thomas Sturman died in 1654 in Westmoreland. In 1652 Thomas Youell received a grant in Northumberland and is mentioned as deceased in that county in 1655. No doubt but that he brought the Kendall orphans with him same as the Butler orphans were brought by John Hallows in 1650. (See V.H.G., p. 25) In fact John Hallows (Hollis) and his family were imported by a Thomas Hoskins who also brought over five members of the Youell family. (C.P. 315) John Hallows arrived on the "Ark & Dove" in 1635. (H.S.F. Vol. 1, p. 4)

Thomas² Kendall with Thomas Goffe and John Willis bought 405 acres of land March 7, 1687/8 in Rappa Co. which afterward fell in King George Co. The deed was from Mallary Peale of Stafford Co. and was witnessed by Lawrence Washington and Richard Lee. (D.B. 7-486)

On March 2, 1716-17, Thomas² Kendall of Parish of Hanover, Richmond Co., made a deed of gift to his son WILLIAM KENDALL and his now wife Elizabeth (dau. of John Combs) of that plantation of 50 acres where said Thomas Kendall now lives and whole personal estate to son William except what I have given to my youngest son, SAMUEL, provided that William live upon said plantation and maintain Thomas Kendall during his natural life. (D.B. 7-196)

Children:

- I. Thomas Kendall Jr., married Abigail. He died before his father and was not mentioned in his above deed. Abigail Kendall, relict of Thomas Kendall, Jr., decd., petitioned for letters of Admn. on his estate June 6, 1716, which were granted. Benj. Strother and Joseph Minton, Sec. (O.B. 6, p. 5) She married secondly William Reed, who, in his will

GOFFE - PROSSER - KENDALL of ESSEX

William Goffe, immigrant ancestor of this family, patented 1000 acres in New Kent, Oct. 7, 1658, for the transportation of 20 persons. (C.P. 380) This land was on the N.E. side of the Mattaponi River. (C.P. 496) On Feb. 18, 1663, his wife, Martha Goffe patented 650 acres of land in the same locality, "formerly granted to William Goffe July 22, 1659, assigned unto John Madison who assigned same to said Martha". (C.P. 496)

After the death of William Goffe his widow married John Prosser, immigrant ancestor of this family, who patented 200 acres Feb. 21, 1663, joining upon land formerly William Goffe's. (C.P. 440) Martha Goffe died before Aug. 28, 1673, for that was the date her second husband, John Prosser, made his will which was probated June 6, 1677. (Sweeney-55) He stated that he was of "Golden Vale, in the Parish of Sittingbourne in the Freshes of Rappahannock Co.", desire to be buried by the side of first wife Martha. His legatees were "now wife, Margaret, 500 acres of land, $\frac{1}{2}$ of moveable estate, and plantation of Golden Vale for life, then to eldest son, John Prosser; to son John also, plantation called Nutgrove; son Samuel Prosser 400 acres adjoining; to sons Roger and Anthony a dividend of 1100 acres upon Mattaponi Swamp. Sons in law Robert and Thomas Goffe to have jointly 200 acres adj. Golden Vale. Sons are under 18. Wife, Margaret, extrx., to be assisted by James Kay.

Margaret Prosser, widow of John Prosser, married secondly Captain Symon Miller, immigrant ancestor of the Miller family. On April 4, 1669, John Prosser deeded to Captain Miller 1000 acres of land on the Rappahannock. (D.B. 1668-72, p. 134) Captain Miller in his will dated Feb. 16, 1679, proven May 22, 1684, gave his wife's son, ANTHONY PROSSER a male foal. (Sweeney-92)

Martha Goffe, dau. of Martha and Thomas Goffe, married first, according to the notes of Judge Embrey, Charles Kendall and then Thomas Kendall. On Aug. 19, 1670, John Prosser deeded to MARTHA, only daughter of his deceased wife, Martha Prosser, now the wife of THOMAS KENDALL, 300 acres adj. George Sheperd, on south side of Rappa. River. (D.B. "V", p. 200) (In 1692 this land fell in Essex County)

On March 24, 1694, Thomas Kendall and wife, Martha, of St. Mary Parish, Richmond Co., sold this 300 acres to Charles Taliafero for 8000 lbs. Tbc. (Essex BK. 0-301) They had evidently moved north of the Rappa. River and lived on the land, 105 acres, patented by Thomas in 1697 adjoining Grimstead and THOMAS GOFFE (N.N.G.B. 1694-1700)

where no councillor resided some other person was appointed with the rank of major."

The men whose names appear in the above list as "majors" and "captains" were members of the most substantial families in their respective counties. Throughout the volumes of the *Virginia Magazine of History and Biography*, the *William and Mary College Quarterly Historical Magazine* (first and second series) and *Tyler's Quarterly Historical and Genealogical Magazine*, as well as in various works on family history, will be found references to these men and accounts, or notes, on the families to which they belonged.

As there were several William Claibornes it may be well to state that "Cap^t Wm. Clabourn," of King & Queen County militia is believed to have been William Claiborne III, son of Colonel William Claiborne II and his wife Elizabeth Wilkes, and grandson of the Honorable William Claiborne I, member of the Governor's Council, secretary and treasurer of the colony of Virginia (*Tyler's Quarterly*, Vol. XXI, pages 245-6). This William Claiborne III (died 1705) lived at Romancoke, succeeding his father in the ownership of that estate. Romancoke was, until 1691, situated in New Kent County, but, in that year, by division of that county, the estate fell within the county of King & Queen, and finally in 1701 by another division of territory it fell within the county of King William. In 1698 Romancoke was in King & Queen and hence we find Captain William Claiborne in the military forces of that county.

Among the Richmond County officers appears the name of Captain Glendining (also spelled Glendening). This gentleman married Ann Mott (1661-1740) of the well known family of the brothers George and John Mott, large land owners in the Northern Neck, and both of whom died in Rappahannock County. John Mott died without issue. George Mott left four daughters, one of whom was Mrs. Ann (Mott) Glendening.

Major Francis Wright, of the Westmoreland County militia, was the son in law of Colonel John Washington (first of his line in Virginia) whose daughter Ann became Wright's wife. "Cap^t Willowby Allerton" of Westmoreland, was Willoughby Allerton, the son of Major Isaac Allerton who came from New England to Westmoreland County, Virginia, and forsaking the sterner ways of his Pilgrim up-bringing, appears to have entered wholeheartedly into the festive life of our southern clime, arranging with his neighbors, John Lee, Henry Corbin and Thomas Gerrard "for building a banqueting house and for entertaining in 1670" (Lee, *Lee of Virginia*, page 530; for the text of this agreement see *Va. Mag.* Vol. VIII, pages 171-2).

This Isaac Allerton, of Westmoreland County, was the son of Isaac and Fear (Brewster) Allerton and grandson of Elder William Brewster, of the Plymouth colony in New England. Captain Willoughby Allerton married (no doubt as his second; at any rate his last wife) Mrs. Hannah (Keene) Bushrod. This lady married *first* Colonel John Bushrod; *second*, Captain Willoughby Allerton; and *third*, Dr. John Cooper (who died in

Alexander Doniphan,* a native of Spain, whose name was thus Anglicized, a Protestant, migrated to England for religious freedom, and thence to Virginia, where he married, some time before the year 1662, an heiress, Margaret, daughter of George Mott, a native of Scotland, and thus came into possession of a large landed estate, of nearly 18,000 acres, located in the Northern Neck. He settled in that part which was subsequently erected into King George County, and died in 1716, leaving issue three sons and three daughters, as follows: Alexander (the ancestor of the distinguished and venerable General A. W. Doniphan, United States Army), Mott, Margaret, Elizabeth, Anne, and Robert. The second son, Alexander Doniphan, married twice—first, Mary Waugh, and, secondly, Catharine Dobbins. Of his issue by the first marriage was a daughter, Elizabeth, born April 12, 1744; died January 15, 1809; married, in 1773, William Smith, son of Joseph and Kitty (Anderson) Smith,† born February 5, 1741; died January 22, 1803. Of their issue of four daughters and three sons, the eldest, Mary Waugh, born January 1, 1775; died September 15, 1811; married, December 18, 1794, Caleb, (son of Thomas) Smith, born in 1761, and died in November, 1814. They had issue:

- i. *Eliza*, born September 25, 1795; died August 14, 1797.
- ii. *William*, the subject of this sketch, born September 6, 1797.
- iii. *Thomas*, born November 15, 1799; married Ann Maria Goodwin, of Caroline County; died April 4, 1847. He studied law with his brother William, and practiced for a time, but later entered the ministry of the Protestant Episcopal Church. By his unwearying exertions he caused the erection of the handsome Gothic church in Parkersburg, West Virginia. Had issue six sons and four daughters. Of the former, Thomas G., who is married, resides with his family in Parkersburg. Another son, Caleb, was reading law when the war with Mexico broke out. He enlisted, served with distinction, and was made a Lieutenant of the United States Artillery. In 1861 he joined the 49th Virginia Regiment, was made Major, and wounded and permanently disabled in the first battle of Manassas; died December 22, 1874.
- iv. *Mary Frances*, born January 9, 1802; married, December 14, 1820, Professor Alexander Keech, President of Potomac Academy, Virginia, who was offered by Mr. Jefferson a professorship in the University of Virginia.

*The tradition held by Alexander Doniphan's descendants is that he was of noble Castilian blood, and had been knighted for gallantry on the field of battle. The parchment patent of his rank, it is said, was carried to Kentucky by his great-grandson, Dr. Anderson Doniphan, in 1792, and is believed to be in the possession of his present representatives.

NOTES ON KAY AND ALLIED FAMILIES.

From Barber's "British Family Names" we learn that the Danish "Kay", the Swedish "Key", the Flemish "Kai" and "Key" and the Dutch "Kea" are variants of Key, a personal name. In Waters' "Genealogical Gleanings in England", pp. 939-940 is given the will of Matthew Kaye of Eastcombe, Parish of East Greenwich, Kent, Gentleman, dated 14 November, 1610, proved 5 October, 1612. Among the numerous relatives mentioned in this will, are Arthur, Francis, Peter and Paul, sons of his deceased brother Arthur, and Peter son of his brother Edward, brother Robert Kaye of Woodsom in the County of York, and his (Robert's) son, John, brothers Richard and George and nephew James, who is to be executor. A brief genealogy of this family is given in the Visitation of Yorkshire, 1563-4, p. 175, showing that Robert, Arthur, Richard, Edward, Francis, George, Matthew (the testator of the above will) and John, were sons of John Kay who married Dorothy, daughter of Robert Maltrever of Woodsom, John Kay being son and heir of Arthur Kay who married Beatrice, the daughter of Matthew Wentworth. It seems likely that Robert Kay of Woodsom in Yorkshire was ancestor of the Virginia immigrants, James¹ and William¹ Kay.

In April, 1670 (Old Rappa 1668-1672, p. 227), we find James¹ and William¹ Kay witnessing a deed from John Prosser to Anthony Savage, and a little later (*Idem.*, p. 320), January 1670/1, James¹ Kay witnesses a power of attorney from George Mott to John Mott. In "Minutes of the Council and General Court of Virginia", p. 249, April 5, 1671, occurs this entry: "whereas Mr. William Drummond claimed a debt due him from the estate of Mr. John Curren deceased amounting to £165 - 15s - 2d and there being an attachment served and returned by the sheriff of Rappahannock in the hands of Mr. James¹ Key, and Captain Christopher Evelyn also claiming another debt due from the estate of the said Curren, the attachment is continued in the said Mr. Keyes' hands." A few years later (*Idem.*, p. 444, March 17, 1675/6), "in the suit brought by Mr. James Kay plaintiff, against Col. George Mason", the plaintiff is ordered to pay costs, etc.; at the same time (*Idem.*, p. 443, March 16, 1675/6), "the difference between Christopher Rogers and William¹ Kay upon an appeal from Stafford County Court is referred back to Stafford Court to re-examine the difference between them and make report to the next General Court." In 1673, James¹ Kay was a justice of Old Rappahannock County (Stanard's Extracts from Rappahannock, Essex, etc., p. 15). We have no land patent for James¹ Kay prior to 1678, but from the preceding notes, he was here by 1670 with definite social standing as is evidenced by his being called "Mister" and was probably born about 1635.

mand that the said bond is not valid to pass an order versus the estate of Raleigh Travers."

John Travers was born about 1656 and in 1674 he would be about 18 years of age. However, on Sept. 9, 1674, JOHN TRAVERS and John Strechley witnessed a deed from John Cornish of Plymouth, Devon, England, to John's step-father, Robert Beckingham, merchant, for 400 acres of land. (D.B. 1666-1682, p. 194) (Duval Va. Col. Abs. 38)

John Travers was the attorney for Nicholas Smith versus John Deane in the Richmond County Court Aug. 2, 1694. (O.B. 1694-99, p. 1) On Feb. 4, 1694, the case of John Travers v. John Bolyston was continued. (O.B.2 - p. 218) On Oct. 8, 1696, attachment was granted John Travers against Thomas Bolyston on declaration. (Fleet 16-176) In 1705 John Travers was one of several merchants in the Northern Neck who signed a petition to Queen Anne to prohibit trade in tobacco with Russia. (3W (2) 251)

No further records of this John Travers or Travis have been found after a cursory search of some of the records of Richmond County. The Order Books of Richmond are very difficult to interpret and it is hoped a more minute search may obtain better results.

The possibility of his removal elsewhere has been considered but a search in other counties and states has been without results.

The date of John² Travers' death is not known. The first will book of Richmond is missing and deed book 3 is lost. John Travers apparently married a daughter of Alexander Doniphan and had at least two sons, Giles³ Travers or Travis, probably the eldest one, was mentioned in Alexander Doniphan's will. The other one from his association with the Doniphan family as hereafter shown was John³ Travers.

Capt. Alexander Doniphan, Justice of the County Court and Sheriff of Richmond, made his will in Richmond County Sept. 20, 1716, same was probated Feb. 6, 1716/17. He gave to his son Mott Doniphan "One hundred and eighty acres lying back of my river lands and to his next son that shall be born. In case that my son Mott should die before another son then to MY GRANDSON GILES TRAVERS. In another clause he gives to "my grandson Gyles Travers a feather bed, young horse and mare." (W.B. 1709-17, p. 297) No further record of this Giles has been found. He probably died in his minority.

Capt. Alexander Doniphan married as his second wife, Margaret, daughter of George Mott. George Mott gave 105 acres to Mary Creed. She dying, said land returned to aforesaid Mott's children. Doniphan's wife's property was adjacent to land of DAVID BRONAUGH. John Fossaker and Elizabeth, his wife, (another daughter of George Mott) sold 135 acres, known as "Creed's land", to Wm. Bronaugh, adjacent to DAVID BRONAUGH and HEABARDS land. The deed was witnessed by both Alexander Doniphans, Dr. and Jr. (Fleet-16, p. 3)

It seems that John³ Travers, who married Mrs. Margaret (Newton) Heabard, June 22, 1722, widow of William Heabard, was
